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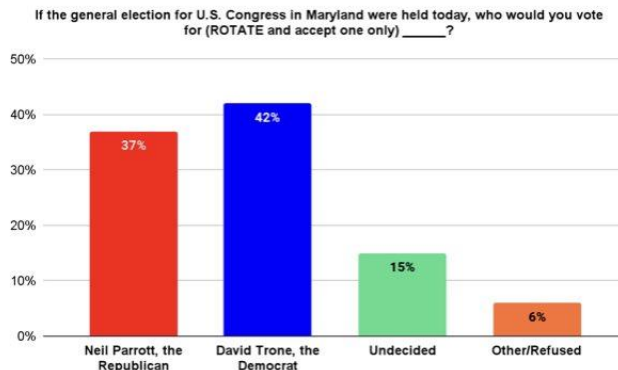

Re: New Survey Results - Maryland's 6th U.S. Congressional District Survey among 300 Registered Likely Voters

With less than three weeks until Election Day and despite pouring millions of dollars of his own money into the race, Congressman David Trone is at 42% on the ballot and the lesser-known Republican challenger, Neil Parrott, is within 5-points. Troubling numbers for a well-funded incumbent Democrat in a seat that is up for grabs.



Further, Trone has a 38% approval rating, while 36% are unsure of the job he is doing. Nearly half of unaffiliated voters are unsure of the job Trone has done.

MD-06 voters were clear on where they stand: a majority disapprove of Biden (54%), mirroring his national job approval, and a majority (52%) want a candidate who will be a check and balance on Biden and the Democrats. Yet, Trone has firmly tied himself to Biden, voting with him 100% of the time. There is no daylight between Trone and Biden, whose one-party Democrat rule in Washington delivered rising costs, rising crime, energy dependence, and an open border. A majority of ages 18-49 (51%), ages 50+ (52%), Men (56%), and unaffiliated voters (52%) want a candidate who will be a check and balance to Biden and the Democrats.

Survey Methodology

The Maryland Republican Party recently commissioned a telephone survey of 300 registered likely voters in Maryland's 6th Congressional District. This quantitative research was conducted between October 18-19, 2022 at a Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) facility (80% mobile phones, 20% landlines). Sampling controls were used to ensure that a proportional and representative number of voters were interviewed from such demographic groups as age, gender, race, and geographic region. The margin of error is $\pm 5.6\%$ at the 95% confidence interval for overall survey, M.O.E.s for subgroups are larger.

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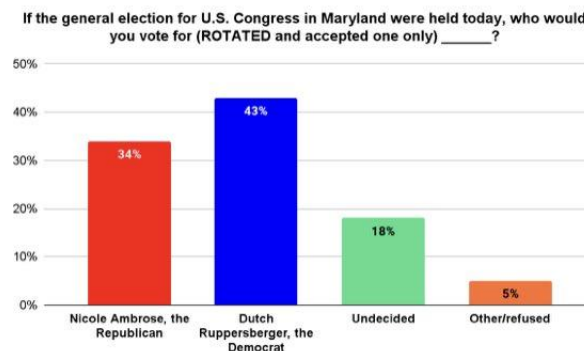

Re: New Survey Results - Maryland's 2nd U.S. Congressional District Survey among 300 Registered Likely Voters

With 19 days to go, 20-year incumbent Congressman, and liberal Democrat, Dutch Ruppertsberger is only at 43% on the ballot, in what is considered to be a safer Democrat seat in a so called "blue state". Ruppertsberger has a 9-point lead against a relatively unknown Republican challenger, Nicole Ambrose. If this follows the national trend, where conservative candidates, and women, are upending long term Democrat incumbents in safe seats, it will be a long night for Democrats.

Additionally, Ruppertsberger has a 40% job approval, despite being in office for two decades, with 3-in-10 unsure of how he is doing his job. This should be a wakeup call for Democrats all over the country.



Further troubling for Ruppertsberger, a majority (54%) of MD-02 voters, in this D+7 House seat, disapprove of President Biden's job performance and 55% said they want a candidate who will be a check and balance on Biden and Democrats. This does not bode well for Ruppertsberger who votes with Joe Biden 100% of the time. A majority of unaffiliated voters, ages 18-49, ages 50+, Men, and white voters prefer a candidate who will be a check and balance by double digits.
